

LEO J. COAKLEY

Leo Coakley is a Roxbury resident since 1979, an Air Force Veteran and retired Civil Engineer. With over 100 hours of training, he is recognized as a "Master Board Member" and "Certified Board Leader" by the NJ School Boards Association. Leo has served on the Roxbury Board of Education since 2013, as President (3 terms) and Vice President, with a continued focus on student achievement and effective use of resources. His two children and five grandchildren have graduated from Roxbury High School, and two grandchildren are current Roxbury students. His community involvement includes being a founding member of the Roxbury Soccer Club, coaching for 10 years, and service to St. Therese Parish and the Wreaths Across American program.

The many positive initiatives implemented during his tenure include: full day kindergarten, restoration of EMS sports programs, recognition of RHS graduates who enlist in military service, security enhancements, curriculum improvements reflecting 21st century needs of our students — all with fiscal management improvements keeping the district within the 2% tax levy cap.



"Roxbury is a great school district. During my nine years on the board I have supported many advancements and new programs, but it is a never-ending process. As conditions and needs change, opportunities for students must change. I have seen how board actions can help or hinder progress and want to see that Roxbury continues to evolve to meet the needs of our students in a fiscally responsible manner."

GOALS & OBJECTIVES

Individual board members have no authority and will accomplish little unless they work together. Each year the district establishes district goals at a public meeting usually held in July, with the goals reviewed and adopted at the September meeting and published on the website. These are the goals that every board member should want to see accomplished by the Superintendent and the district staff.

With that context, Leo believes that one important action of the board is to support the resources necessary to hire and retain qualified educators and staff. To that end, as chairman of the board's negotiations committee since 2016, he has worked with fellow board members, the administration and our union leaders towards improvement of our employee contracts and salary guides in a financially sustainable manner. The extent of improvements that can be made from one contract to the next is limited, and to be effective and sustainable the process must continue over several negation events. If elected, he would like to see that evolution continue so that Roxbury can attract and retain the educators and other staff required to meet the needs of our students in a financially sustainable manner. One obvious recent benefit of progress made in this arena is that Roxbury has not suffered from the lack of qualified bus drivers which has plagued some other districts this year.

Another area in which he would like to see further progress is the meeting of the needs of the non-college bound students as well as the needs of our college bound grads. Roxbury has made significant improvements and progress for both categories of students in recent years, but this is an area that requires continual attention.

BIGGEST CHALLENGE FACING SCHOOLS IN ROXBURY AND HOW WILL YOU ADDRESS THEM

First, it is important to remember that the board does not administer the schools. That is the role of the professional educators and staff. The role of board members is to develop policy and establish priorities. Whatever the challenge facing a district, an individual board member must work with fellow board members and the superintendent to establish appropriate policies and priorities, including allocation of resources.

COVID-19 has been the visible challenge since March 2020, but Roxbury was well equipped to weather the storm because of actions taken well ahead of the crisis, not the least of which was being digitally ready for the short notice closure of our schools. Board support of supplying Chromebooks to students and outstanding support of educator professional development over several years helped lead to Roxbury being prepared for the transition. So, meeting the challenge of COVID-19 didn't start in March 2020 in Roxbury. It started in about 2014 when the district started its move towards digital literacy and provided students with the necessary resources under the 1:1 initiative. There were other programs or activities that contributed to the readiness for the COVID-19 challenge, including digital badging, mindfulness training and advancements in social emotional learning. This is an example of the district "Preparing the children of today for tomorrow."

While all of this is quite visible, it should not overshadow the ever-present challenge of meeting the needs of each student to help them reach their potential. That is perhaps the most important challenge of the district. One that requires continual assessment, evaluation and evolution.

"I believe that my active participation on the Roxbury Board of Education, working with fellow board members, the administration and others, has contributed towards Roxbury being the great district that it is today. If selected by the voters of Roxbury, I would be pleased to continue in those efforts to help the district meet the ever-evolving needs of our students."

KATIE GOEKE

Katie Goeke has been a Roxbury resident for over 21 years - the longest she has lived in any one place — and the place she considers home. She has twins who grew up in Roxbury, attended Jefferson and Lincoln/Roosevelt elementary schools, Eisenhower Middle School, and who are now seniors in Roxbury High School. She is very involved in the activities they participate in; she has been part of the PTAs, chaperoned class field trips, coached girls' recreation volleyball, and is currently Co-President of the Roxbotics Boosters, and the Fundraising Chair for the Band Parents Association.

In this latter role, she advocated for, established and ran a first-ever yard sale which was a very successful fundraiser for the band program.

By profession, she has worked for Mondelez (makers of Oreo, Ritz, and Sour Patch Kids) in Consumer Insights/Market Research for 24 years. Her role there is to bring the voice of the consumer to the business: to advocate for consumers by understanding them as people and consumers, and ensuring decisions made in the organization are based on information and facts about what they want and need.



"I believe a strong school system is key to the strength of the community. Roxbury is my home, and I want our community to flourish and attract new families for continued vitality. With two kids in high school, and as a Roxbury taxpayer, I have a vested interest in the strongest possible education our district can provide. I think it's important to bring in new perspectives from time-to-time, and as a new member, I will bring my views as a parent and community member to the Board. I am also quite good at listening to stakeholders, asking probative questions to get to underlying issues, and then advocating for appropriate solutions. I do that every day in my profession."

GOALS & OBJECTIVES

In the big picture, Katie wants Roxbury schools to be the school district of choice, the place young families want to make their home. While the district has a strong foundation here, she believes there is always room for growth.

As the newcomer, she will first focus on learning and information gathering. While she has a general understanding of how the Board of Education works, and what the role is, she looks forward to immersing herself in the processes and then looking for ways she might optimize them.

Once established, she would like to focus on accountability and transparency, between the administration, the board, parents, and the community. She thinks too many times things happen in a black box, and a simple explanation and rationale can go a long way toward shared understanding and hopefully, better parent engagement.

She would also like to ensure the district is allocating money to those people, things and activities that will bring the best return on that investment. A large portion of the taxpayers' taxes go toward supporting the schools, and we have a fiduciary responsibility as Board members to act responsibly in return.

BIGGEST CHALLENGE FACING SCHOOLS IN ROXBURY AND HOW WILL YOU ADDRESS THEM

Of course, COVID has been a huge challenge for the past 18 months. I am pleased we are back in school in-person, and understand the district is assessing and addressing education and social/emotional COVID impacts. For the next year, I would anticipate that will be a major priority.

Beyond COVID, we need to continue to evolve in anticipation of future job markets for all students. Portrait of a Graduate lays a comprehensive groundwork of the principles important for all our students. We need to be sure we're delivering on those goals and principles and evaluating progress regularly. This will ensure that the district is developing students who are ready for their personal next challenge, including new challenges or career options we may not yet be aware of.

"My first priority is my children. I thoroughly enjoy watching them grow, learn and develop into good, smart, capable human beings. My professional focus is being the voice of the consumer and making informed decisions. And I strongly believe in the value of education. Learning is a lifelong skill that starts in our schools. I will bring my involvement and dedication, and my love of information to the Roxbury Board of Education, to advocate for our students, our teachers and our community."


AMY L. OVERMAN

Amy Overman and her husband Brian have resided in Ledgewood since 2012 with their two daughters. Amy has been active in the Roxbury community currently serving on Roxbury's Planning Board, as well as being an active member at Ledgewood Baptist Church.

Amy was drawn to the Roxbury community during her 14-year career in the New Jersey Legislature, with nine years as Chief of Staff to the late Senator Anthony R. Bucco, and one year with Assemblywoman Aura K. Dunn. She resigned in 2021 due to the pandemic and has recently started working at the American Christian School.

Amy's legislature career makes her uniquely suited to serve on Roxbury's school board. She has a keen understanding of state policy as it pertains to public education, and years of experience with governmental budgeting. GOALS & OBJECTIVES

She feels that the Roxbury School district largely accomplishes this goal but she wants to find further areas of improvement. She is a big believer that public school districts, and government bodies in general, can provide superior programs and services to students but be run efficiently as possible for taxpayers of the community. She will look for ways that the district can potentially provide further cost savings while not compromising the quality of our programs and schools.

BIGGEST CHALLENGE FACING SCHOOLS IN ROXBURY AND HOW WILL YOU ADDRESS THEM

The most pressing issue in our school district is navigating out of the COVID pandemic, as conditions and directives allow. We should always be working toward giving students and staff a normal school day without the need for precautions or masks. I was so impressed during the 2020/2021 school year with how the administration and school board handled COVID, from being technologically equipped for hybrid or virtual learning, while expanding and not contracting in-person activities while some neighboring districts struggled getting out of the virtual environment. Beyond COVID, I feel that students as a whole need to feel there are a variety of options as it pertains to their post-secondary education. I want to help continue to build on addressing those needs in Roxbury while maintaining exceptional academics for those looking to attend post-secondary colleges and universities for a higher degree.

"As a collaborative person who always places what is best for my community above myself, I will work hard to ensure that the interests and concerns of all students and their families are taken into account when making decisions. If elected to the Board of Education, I look forward to working with other members of the board and the administration to implement the district goals set for the upcoming year."

Our staff, parents and administration play a very pivotal role in accomplishing this and we must take into consideration their feelings and emotions are also very important. BRIAN STAPLES

Brian Staples has lived in Roxbury for the past four years with his wife of 12 years and their two children, Bradley (9 years old) and Abigail (8 years old). He graduated from Parsippany Hills High School and then went on to graduate with a Bachelors Degree in History with a focus in secondary education from William Paterson University.

From there, he got my first teaching job at Wallington High School, teaching 8th grade Social Studies and Advanced Placement United States History. While at Wallington he coached multiple sports and was the advisor for various clubs. He was the Varsity Girls' Basketball and Varsity Softball Head Coach while also coaching football in the fall. Throughout his time there he also coached boys' basketball and baseball and was the advisor for the Academic Decathlon.
